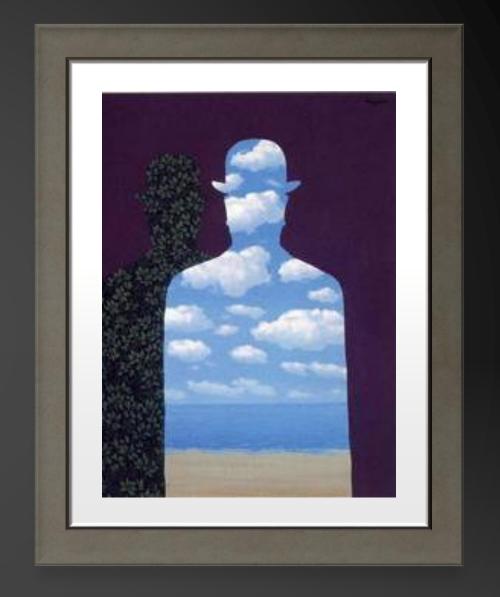

• Turning something familiar into something unusual and disturbing.

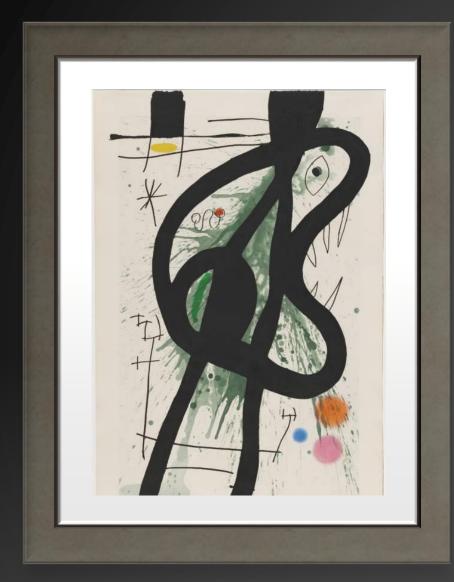
The Red Model, 1934

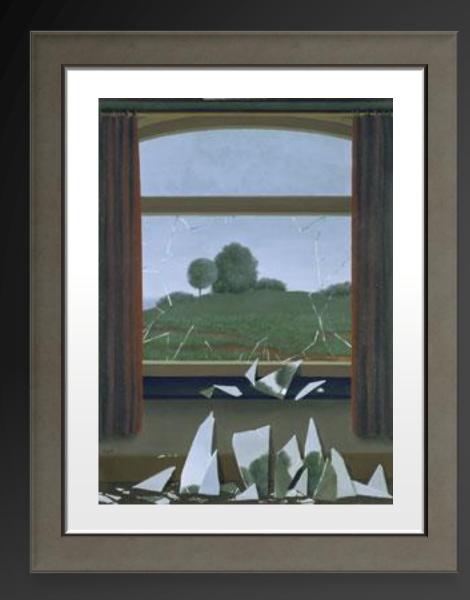


RENÉ MAGRITTE (1898-1967)



- In English: This is not a pipe.
- Magritte wanted to point out that paintings were illusions.
- He said: Of course it's not a pipe!
 Just try putting tobacco in it!
