

Braille

Lots of blind people use Braille to read and write. Braille is a code using dots on a page. People who can't see can read the dots with their fingers. Louis Braille was the inventor of Braille. He was only 15 years old and he was blind. Lots of countries use Braille text. Different languages use the same Braille alphabet. But some languages have got extra Braille symbols, for example, Spanish Braille has got symbols for accented letters like é or ñ.

Sign Language

Lots of people who are deaf and can't hear or speak, use sign language to communicate. People use their hands, body and face in sign language. Different countries have got different sign languages. Different sign languages have got different alphabets to spell words. There are gestures for some words and ideas, too. There is also a universal sign language called 'Gestuno', but people don't use it very often.



