Describe what you can see	Make Speculations
<p>The place, the people: <i>there is a /there are some...</i>, <i>I can see</i></p> <p>Where: in the center, ON the right / left, behind, opposite, next to, under, above, in the background/foreground ...</p> <p>Actions: <i>she is dancing...</i> / <i>they are carrying...</i></p> <p>Clothes, age, weather or any other detail, no matter how tiny it may look...</p> <p>...the most important thing is to keep talking!</p>	<p><i>Perhaps / Maybe, ...</i></p> <p><i>I think / I guess ...</i></p> <p><i>It seems to me that ...</i></p> <p><i>It looks + adjective/adverb</i></p> <p><i>It looks like + noun</i></p> <p><i>It looks as if + sentence</i></p> <p>MODAL VERBS: He <u>may</u> be tired/ They <u>must</u> be late/ <i>It can't be summer ...</i></p> <p>"It reminds me of..." this can be the starting point to build your own story based on the picture!</p> <p>Reminder: always give reasons for your assumptions!</p>

Similarities	Differences
<i>In BOTH pictures ...</i>	<i>Both pictures show different aspects of ...</i>
<i>The common topic is ...</i>	<i>The building in picture A is different from the one in picture B</i>
<i>"The weather in picture A is the same as in B"</i>	<i>The family in A is much bigger than in B ...</i>
<i>"In picture A there are as many people as in B"</i>	<i>The film in B looks less interesting than in A</i>
