THEORY ABOUT REGULAR & IRREGULAR PAST FORMS:

Used to + Infinitive

This periphrastical form is employed to refer to a past routine or habitual actions in the past.

Its meaning is: Solía + Infinitivo

Examples:

AFFIRMATIVE FORMS	NEGATIVE FORMAS	INTERROGATIVE FORMS
I used to eat apples for dessert.	I didn't use to eat apples for breakfast.	Did you use to eat apples for dinner?
You used to eat	You didn't eat	Did you use to eat
He/ She / It used to eat	He/ She / It didn't use to eat	Did he / she / it use to eat
We used to eat	We didn't use to eat	Did we use to eat
You used to eat	You didn't use to eat	Did Yyu use to eat
They used to eat	They deidn't use to eat	Did they use to eat
apples for dessert.	apples for breakfast.	apples for dinner?
Yo (Ellos)solía comer / generalmente comía manzanas al desayuno.	Yo (Ellos)no solía comer / generalmente no comía manzanas al desayuno.	Solía yo (Ellos) comer / generalmente comía yo(ellos) manzanas al desayuno?

Rememmber: The Forns of the Verb There Be: Haber

Present Simple of There be uses the forms:

- There is for the singular and There are for the plural (AFFIRMATIVE)
- There isn't for the singular and There aren't for the plural (NEGATIVE)
- **Is there** for the singular and **Are there** for the plural (INTERROGATIVE)

Past Simple of There be uses the forms:

- There was for the singular and There were for the plural (AFFIRMATIVE)
- There wasn't for the singular and There weren't for the plural (NEGATIVE)
- Was there for the singular and Were there for the plural (INTERROGATIVE)

This periphrastical form is used with the verb There be. Haber

AFFIRMATIVE FORMS	NEGATIVE FORMAS	INTERROGATIVE FORMS
There used to be a radio at home.	There didn't use to be a radio at home.	Did there use to be a radio at home?
Solía haber / generalmente	No solía haber / generalmente	Solía haber / generalmente
