CONJUNCTIONS

- Unless: we use it to mean "if...not". Mostly in 1st conditionals
 I won't wear my raincoat unless it rains.
- Even if: we use it to mean an emphatic "if"
 Even if he won the lottery, he would still eat cheeseburgers.

TIME CLAUSES:

When they refer to future, they're formed as first conditional clauses: will+Infinitive and Present Simple after conjunctions like when, as soon as, as long as, by the time. etc.

I will phone you as soon as she arrives

- As long as / Providing (that) / Provided (that) / On Condition (that): we use it to mean "but only if". They're more formal and emphatic "if" I'll lend her the money on condition (that) she gives it back to me next week.
