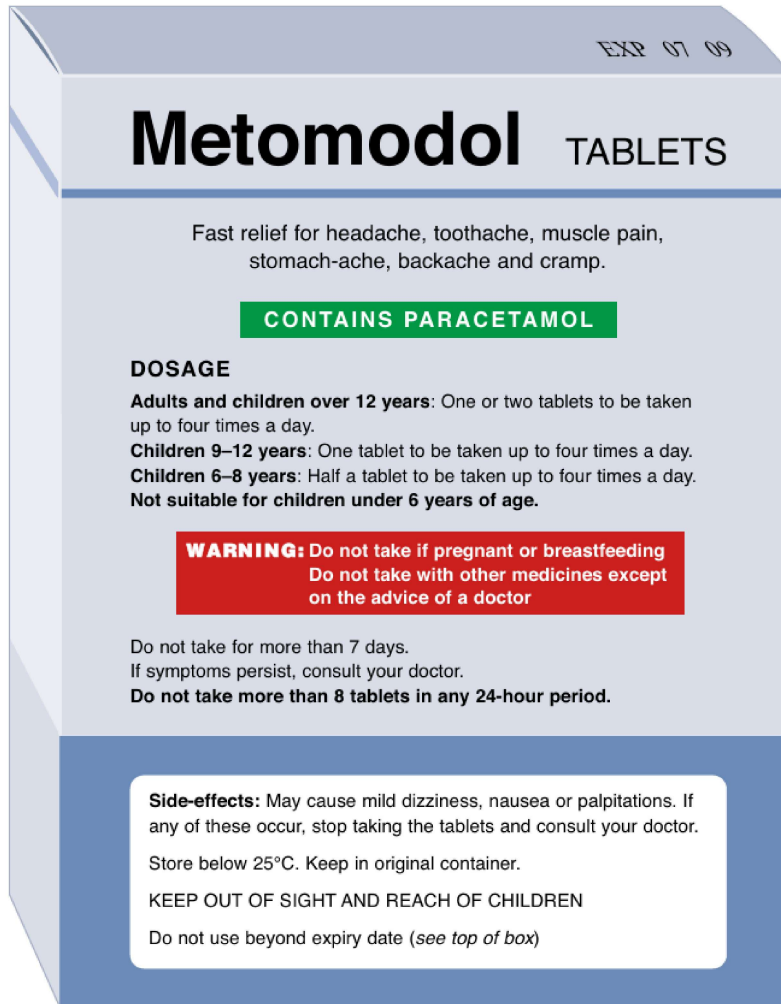

1. **COUGHRELIEF SYRUP** - EXP 11/27

Fast relief for dry cough, sore throat and chest irritation.

DOSAGE

Adults and children over 12: 10 ml to be taken every 6 hours.

Children 6–12 years: 5 ml every 6 hours.

Not suitable for children under 6.

WARNINGS

Do not take with other cough medicines except on the advice of a doctor.

Do not take more than 4 doses in any 24-hour period.

SIDE-EFFECTS

May cause drowsiness, dry mouth or mild dizziness.

2. **EYECALM DROPS** - EXP 03/28

Hydrating eye drops for dry eyes, red eyes and irritation caused by screen use or dust.

DOSAGE

Adults and children over 10: Apply 2 drops in each eye up to 3 times a day.

Children under 10: Use only on medical advice

WARNINGS

Remove contact lenses before use.

Do not touch the tip of the bottle with your fingers.

Do not share this product with other people.

SIDE-EFFECTS

May cause temporary blurred vision or mild burning in the eyes.

3. **ANTISEPCARE CREAM** - EXP 05/28

Antiseptic cream for cuts, burns, scratches and minor skin infections.

DOSAGE

Apply a small amount to the affected area 2–3 times a day.

WARNINGS

Avoid contact with eyes and mouth.

Do not use if allergic to any ingredient in the cream.

SIDE-EFFECTS

May cause mild skin irritation, redness or itching.

Stop use immediately if a rash appears.
